ACADEMIC REGALIA

The costume of those in the academic procession has a specific symbolism which dates back to the eighth century. Until early in the last century, the gowns were worn during all classes from secondary school onward as a kind of distinctive clerical garb since all students were avowed to a course of discipleship. As the disestablishment of academia became more common, the gowns were reserved for particular convocations and processions only. Hoods, draped over the shoulders and down the back, indicate the subject and level of mastery an academician has attained. The mortarboard caps represent the practical wisdom and constructive applicability of the degreed achievement. The tassels represent the appropriate adornment of knowledge and understanding. They are fastened to the center of the caps and are worn in the left front quadrant until a degree is awarded and then they are shifted to the right front quadrant following commencement.

*The tradition of each class bearing a shield began in May 2004 when the class of 2010 presented a custom-made shield as a gift to the Grammar School upon their rise from the Grammar School into the Logic School. This tradition has moved to the eighth grade class as they matriculate into the Rhetoric School. These shields represent a legacy of love and encouragement for the lower grades to follow.
